The Orchid Growers' Manual; Williams

Orchid Growing Illustrated; Ritterhausen

Orchids are not the easiest plants to grow, but for serious gardeners, preferably those with a greenhouse, the Rittershausens describe in detail the many requirements for success; while encouraging amateurs, though, this book is clearly aimed toward the experienced. The rather dry text is more than compensated for by a multitude of

photographs, both black-and-white and color. In fact, the pictures really tell the story, with text captioning the illustrations. With a subject as diverse as orchids, which grow naturally in almost every part of the world, and whose needs are as different as their origins, the Rittershausens have managed to convey their expertise to those who are looking for a demanding but rewarding challenge. Orchid Hunting in the Lost World (And Elsewhere in Venezuela); Dunsterville

This is an interesting mixture of botany and adventure which appeared in the American Orchid Society Bulletin over a 40 year period. The Lost World was made famous by Arthur Conan Doyle.

The Orchid Thief; Orleans

*The Orchid Thief centers on south Florida and John Laroche, a quixotic, charismatic schemer once convicted of attempting to take endangered orchids from the Fakahatchee swamp, a state preserve. Laroche, a horticultural consultant who once ran an extensive nursery for the Seminole tribe, dreams of making a fortune for the Seminoles and himself by cloning the rare ghost orchid *Polyrrhiza lindenii*. Laroche sums up the obsession that drives him and so many others:*

Orchids for the South; Kramer, 1994

Kramer brings his considerable expertise to bear in this instructional book about growing "warmth-loving" orchids, plants especially well suited to the southern regions of the country. All sorts of orchids are described, but Kramer concentrates on optimum conditions, culture, containers, and other needs for the specific orchid hybrids he features. He does a fine job of answering questions that someone new to orchid growing might ask, definitely motivating any southern gardener yearning to grow orchids either indoors or in outdoor situations. Includes lists of plant suppliers, equipment suppliers, and books. Color illustrations of 200 recommended orchid varieties included.

Orchids of Africa; Stewart and Hennessey

Author Joyce Stewart and artist Esmé Hennessey, worldwide well-known botanists published this wonderful book on African orchids in 1981. Part 1 contains review of the African orchids south of the Sahara, including descriptions of the kinds of plants and flowers, their structure and habits, and the first complete list of the currently recognized genera. In part 2, 50 selected species are illustrated by Hennessey's detailed paintings in full color, while Stewart's text describe them botanically and discusses their origins, habitat and introduction to cultivation.

Orchids of Jamaica; Glouden; 1995

Orchids of Papua New Guinea: Andree Millar

Andree Millar went to Papua New Guinea with her husband in 1947. While there they became interested in collecting ferns, orchids and other plants. Although this is not a botanical work, it is a pictorial and geographical record of some of the beautiful orchid flora of Papua New Guinea. It ia the book for those in Papua New guinea who are growing orchids for the first time, and for thousands of orchid growers around the world who are just discovering the beauty of these orchids and the joy of cultivating them.

Orchids: The Pictorial Encyclopedia Of Oncidium; Zelenko, 2003

Orchids: The Pictorial Encyclopedia of Oncidium is an important addition to any library, and persons interested in orchids will want this comprehensive volume. It is the only book devoted exclusively to the Oncidium alliance that shows plants and flowers meticulously painted to actual size in color from living orchids by expert botanical illustrators. Definitive essays for each of the sections have been written by renowned experts on Oncidium. The book has been edited by Mark W. Chase, one of the world's top authorities on this group of orchids. This cloth-bound, hardcover volume has 148 pages. Most pages are printed in color on 100 lb. dull-coated paper. The book measures 9½ x 13 inches.

The remarkable orchids of the Oncidium alliance are among the world's showiest and most popular orchids. Native to the Americas, most grow from sea level up to 12,000 feet on trees as epiphytes, although some grow terrestrially. The many hybrids of Oncidium have contributed to their popularity. Often seen in home-design magazines, those little yellow flowers have become recognizable to the general public, but there are many magnificent species that are not so well known in the Oncidium Alliance. It is these, as well as the better known species, that are the subject of this book. There are

more than 850 plants and flowers meticulously painted by a group of expert botanical illustrators. Many new species have been added since the original edition, and many more species names are given. The book includes the latest taxonomy based on botanical DNA as well as essays by orchid experts with specialized knowledge of each group in the Oncidium alliance. Included is a DNA "tree" that shows the relationship of the species, plus a comprehensive bibliography and a functional index.

Wild Orchids of Illinois; Winterringer

Winterringer's contribution to the Illinois literature on native orchids is fairly useful to those of us who want to learn more about our native orchids. This small volume contains carefully-drawn line drawings for each species listed, brief botanical descriptions of the plants with their scientific and common names, general information about distribution (no specifics), habitat requirements, flowering times, and predominant flower colors. Two indexes, one of common and one of scientific names, makes it easy to find entries. One beautiful color photo as frontispiece and twenty-eight pages of black and white photographs add to the value of this volume, all of them by people significant in Illinois and midwestern native orchid conservation.
